- ◆ Mr. Wolfe's Genetics students researched the

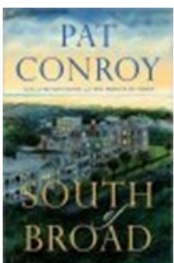
history of genetics to create a timeline of noted events and contributors.

Book Review: *South of Broad* by Pat Conroy



Fourteen years after *Beach Music*, award winning author Pat Conroy has published a new novel set in Charleston, South Carolina. As he struggles to cope with the suicide of his brother, the main character Leo King reaches out to a group of friends who remain close for two decades until their friendship is tested. The author switches back and forth between the late 1960s and the late 1980s. Along the way Leo's group of friends face the struggles of racism in the South, the success and pitfalls of Hollywood, and the struggles of love and addiction.
