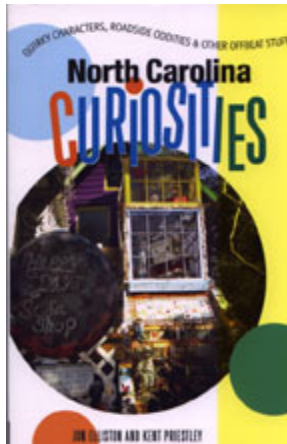
What's Happening In The Media Center?

AAAHHHHH—Exams!/: Tackling Exam Questions

Multiple Choice questions

Read the stem (beginning of the question) and then try to come up with the correct answer before you look at the answer choices. If the answer is not obvious, consider all choices and look for clues in the stem that allow you to rule out choices. Cross out the incorrect choices. Make your selection and/or mark that question to review after you have completed the exam.

Essay questions

First, be familiar with your material. Manage your time and read all directions and questions carefully. Consider how to organize your essay by writing a brief outline. Get to the point right away and support your opinions with solid evidence. End with a summary.
